

# SENIORS ENTERTAIN MARKSTAY

On Friday evening, Docember 6th, the Garson Senior C.Y.O. played host to the Markstay Younger Set. The second speaker of the Affirmative, George Hamilton, of Markstay, sharpened his audgels in defence for the country when he enumerated a series of arguments in which he contended that the city cannot sustain itself with-out dependence of the country; he also brought forth arguments regarding the health of country citizens, their rural work, their entertainment and several other facilities which makes country life self-sustaining. The second speaker of the Negative, Cyril C. stonguay, stressed the fertility and quality of city life-pointing out features possessed by a city which cannot be found in the His arguments broached upon sanitation, mode of living, commerce, and hospitalization.
