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## EDITORIAL

"RECTITUDE IS PERPETUAL VICTORY"HOW MUCH ARE YOU WORTH TO YOURSELF?

In other words, what sum would you give a man who saved your life?

In a witty novel by Mr. Anthony Powell, one of the characters appraised the value of his existence at one dollar, the amount he gave his rescuer.

A lady, on being rescued from the sea with great difficulty and at considerable risk by the boatman generously rewarded him with a 25¢ piece, which looks like self-depreciation carried to its farthest point.

What sum would you give under similar circumstances? Self-appraisal is not often engaged in by most of us. We know the price of groceries, automobiles, clothes, and real estate, but we seldom know our own worth.

At times we see a man with his own price tag. There is the egotist who prices himself highly--often too highly. An egotist is never a bargain. His appraisal is often an exaggerated estimate of himself: it is an inflated price. And so he is a drug on the market. Nobody esteems an egotist; rather we let him enjoy his own vanity. He is not a social asset, and in business, he usually is alone.

Then there is the man who under-values himself. Some call it an inferiority complex. He is priced too low. He is worth more than he thinks. Such a man sees only his feet; he is always looking down.

The depreciator is the locker-down. He sees no reason for making himself up. Life for him has no challenge--there are no heights to climb, no victories to win, no achievements to seek, nothing tells him his true worth, tests his capabilities or measures his powers. Thus he has a low price tag.

What is the true perspective of one's self, where a full appreciation of worth and a proper estimate of one's value are obtained? Modesty is always the mark of confident strength and true greatness. Strutting is the sign of false virtue and faint powers. Modesty denotes achievements without boasting, and grace without glamour.
