

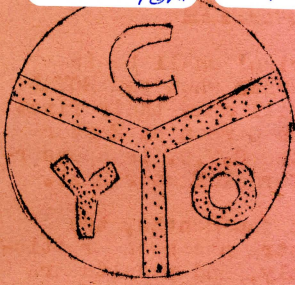

PATRON OF STUDENTS

March 7th is the feast of St. Thomas Aquinas, patron and model of students. Though this young nobleman had an unusually brilliant mind, he cared so little for applause that he concealed his progress in his studies from his fellow students, so that they thought him stupid. Little did they dream that he would one day become one of the greatest theologians and Doctors of the Church. But though they were not aware of his mental gifts, his fellow students could not fail to see that the young son of the Count of Aquino was a model of purity and goodness, despite the many and great temptations of university life in those days. In later years St. Thomas received a singular proof of divine approval. While writing his masterpiece, Summa Theologiae, which contains the sum total of Catholic doctrine and philosophy, he heard our Lord's voice speak to him from his crucifix: "Thou has written well of me, Thomas; what recompense dost thou desire?" "No other than thyself, O Lord," was the saint's reply. St. Thomas lived in the 13th century. He was a member of the Order of St. Dominic.

EDITORIAL

"RECTITUDE IS A PERPETUAL VICTORY"

BE ORIGINAL FOR A CHANGE

"True originality consists not in being different from others, but in being wholly in harmony with one's self." --quotation--

In whatever profession one may enter the subject of originality rears its ugly head, and unless one is prepared to overcome it, it is quite useless to carry on in this chosen vocation. If you are a painter, an idea of your own is worth a great deal more than an idea that you may have borrowed from some contemporary of yours. Similarly if you are a writer, an architect, or for that matter any type of poor working soul, an idea of your own will help you along tremendously.

The idea of true originality does not end at this point, there are those parasites that are willing to benefit from the ideas of others. In the writing profession he is a plagiarist, in anything else he, she, or they are just plain ordinary copy-cats. Here is what I mean, now, this is just a fictitious (sic) example. Suppose a group got together and formed a society for the abolishment of juvenile delinquency; during the course of their work, they decided to publish periodicals which would carry news of their work to the members and others who were interested. After a few weeks of existence there arises another group, also formed for the abolishment of juvenile delinquency (sic), also formed to imitate and undermine the prestige of the first organization. Immediately, they formulate plans to publicate a periodical very similar to the first one. Never underestimating the underhandedness of the new group, they would probably try to have their tabloid printed by the first group. Now this sort of mockery could go on indefinitely, but I have cited a few examples as to what could happen if there were some people that didn't have any ideas of their own.

A borrower of ideas portrays a shallow disposition and a conniving attitude which is by no means a virtuous quality. Often, it is better to leave undone or undertaken what can not be accomplished, if the accomplishment will only depend upon an encroachment, upon someone else's achievements. It takes character and a balanced disposition to say 'no' when such should be the case, and oftentimes, and by many, it is better not to undertake than to do so on borrowed terms.
