"RECTITUDE IS A PERPETUAL VICTORY"

PENETANGUISHENE

Finding myself in one of Ontario's School Hall, sponsored by the oldest towns, Penetanguishen, (which name translated from the Indian tongue, means 'the land of rolling white sands') -- hence, I thought it fitting to write, for the Bulletin readers, a short sketch of the town's early history.

Penetanguishene has a history that stretches far into the past, and is almost as old as Quebec City itself. It began with the coming of Jesuit priests in 1615 to establish Missions among the Hurons, and with Champlain's visit in the same year. These early missions were wiped out by Iroquois raids. However, not long after, the union of the two Indian villages of Winrio and Ihonataria, which had been built about that time, marked the real beginn-ing of the Penetanguishene that stands today.

During the two centuries that followed, nothing of historical interest took place in this locality. The first occurrence worthy of note was the establishment, in the early 1800's, by Lieutenant Governor Sim-cos, of a road from York (now Toronto) to Holland Landing, thence by water to Kimpenfeldt Bay (Barrie), and on a direct line from there to

Penetanguishene. In 1818, a military and naval post was established at Penetang. Log barracks were built at first, but were replaced by stone barracks at the time of the 1837-8 Rebellion; the Officer's Quarters of that time still remain. Before the century had run half its course, however, the post was abandoned and turned over to the Canadian Government for settlement, thus disestablishing the most inland Canadian military post over which the English flag ever flew.

Celebrated visitors to Penetang. historic shores include: John Galt, the Superintendent of the Canada Co., who passed through on his way to its immense tracts of land on the Lake Huron shore in 1827; Sir John Frank-lin on his first journey in search of the 'North-West Passage' in 1825; and Lord Sydenham, the Governor-General in 1841.

Penetanguishene in 1881 was thriving and prosperous, with a population of twelve hundred, about 20 stores and 12 hotels. It was a port of entry, and it exported about 30 million feet of cut lumber. Besides the saw-mills, there were a number of mechanic's shops, two tanneries, a grist mill, a foundry, and a glass factory.

Penetanguishene in 1947 is an ordinary Ontario town with a population of something less than five thousand -- chief industry, boat-building.

HELPFUL HEDDIE SAYS.....

"Fish for the Lenten Season!" Here is a tasty recipe--CREAMED SALT COD:

1 cup flaked cod

1 cup cubed raw potatoes Simmer gently until potatoes are tender (about 15 min.). Drain, and add 1 cup of thin hot white sauce made from 1 tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 cup milk. Reheat and add 1 tablespoon lemon juice. To prepare salt fish for cooking, soak about 24 hours in cold water.

1 cup cracked crumbs

l egg Nutmeg, paprika, salt Remove bones from the salmon, and break into small pieces, add well beaten egg, seasoning and cracked crumbs. Bake in a well-buttered dish for 15 minutes. Serve hot.
