ping of the garments from Our Lord.  
On Holy Thursday, Our Lord instituted  
the Holy Eucharist and for this rea-  
son also we visit the repository to  
offer thanks to Our Lord for His  
priceless gift.

## Good Friday--

The death of Our Lord fills our  
hearts--the Church puts on the black  
of mourning and recounts the story  
of the Crucifixion. The service  
consists of the lessons, the prayers,  
veneration of the Cross, and the  
Mass of the Presanctified.

Everyone should try to attend  
every service on Good Friday. We  
should always keep our minds and  
hearts on the price Our Saviour  
paid for our salvation, and with  
gratitude in our hearts always  
thank Him.

Him our gratitude is by receiving

INDISCRETION
