Dear Sir/-

I am today in receipt of a letter from the Department of the Honourable the Attorney General which I consider proper to be brought to your notice, it speaks for itself and is as follows.

"Toronto 18 th May, 1905.

" Dear Sir/- It is once more necessary to call your attention to the manner in which regard has been had to the law with regard to tramps and Vagrants. Men of this class are believed to be responsible for a large number of burglaries and other crimes of violence, and it has been found that the best results are obtained by imposing the full term of imprisonment in the Central Prison, allowed by law. The practice of giving them the option of a fine or leaving the Municipality, has been found most unsatisfactory, and I am directed to say that when any men of this class are brought before you, you should administer the law strictly and vigourously, as in this way alone can serious crime be prevented. Instructions of this nature have been sent out previously but have not been carried out as they should have been and it is expected that attention will be paid to the directions herein contained. As the Railway authorities are co-operating with this Department I have to ask you at all times to assist the Railway Constables who may be acting in this class of cases. Yours truly J.R.
